

# How to Shoot a Professional Testimonial Video

A simple guide for shooting at home or in a studio space with minimal crew



# **Preparing Your Space**



# **Background**

- Preferred: A plain black background (black curtain, backdrop, or wall).
- Alternative: Any simple background is fine as long as the subject is at least 6 feet (2 meters) away from the wall.
- Avoid clutter or distracting objects behind you.

### **Noise Control**

- Choose a quiet space with minimal outside noise (close windows, turn off fans/AC if possible).
- Silence phones and other devices before recording.

# **Camera Setup**

- Place the camera at eye level with the subject.
- Use a tripod or stable surface avoid handheld unless absolutely necessary.
- Frame the subject with head and shoulders visible from Waist Up (medium shot).

- Leave a little space above the head ("headroom") and center the subject.
- Shoot in 4k if your camera has the capability. If not, then 1920 x
  1080 is fine.



# **Lighting (Three-Point Lighting)**

For professional results, use the three-point lighting setup:







# **Key Light**

- 1. Main light source, placed about 45 to one side of the subject.
- 2. Should be the brightest light.

## Fill Light

- 1. Placed on the opposite side of the key light, softer and less bright.
- 2. Helps remove harsh shadows.

## **Back Light (Hair/Edge Light)**

- 1. Positioned behind the subject, slightly above and pointing toward the back of the head/shoulders.
- 2. This separates the subject from the background and adds depth.
- □ Tip: If you don't have professional lights, you can use lamps or LED lights—but still follow the same placement principles.

# Sound Recording

Best option: Use a lapel (lav) microphone clipped to the subject's clothing.


Alternative: A shotgun microphone close to the subject, just outside the frame.

If using the camera's built-in mic, ensure the room is very quiet.

Always do a quick sound test before recording.

# Recording Tips

- Have the subject look directly into the camera lens, not at the screen.
- Ask them to speak naturally, like they're talking to a friend.
- Ask them to start by Introducing themselves
- Record a test clip (video + audio) to check framing, lighting, and sound.
- Record at least two takes for safety.
- Keep the camera rolling a few seconds before and after speaking.





# **Final Checklist**



# **Background**

Plain (black preferred), subject 6 feet from the wall.



### Camera

Eye level, tripod, stable framing.



# Lighting

Three-point (key, fill, back).



## Sound

External mic if possible, quiet space.



### **Performance**

Relaxed, clear, natural delivery.
